Young people in England are required to continue in education or training until the end of the academic year in which they turn 18.

egally, you can leave school on the last Friday in June if they'll be 16 by the end of the summer holidays. However, by September, you will need to be in official education or training.

It's a good idea for you to explore the different education and career options available to you as early as possible.

Whatever you want to do in life, a good standard of education and training will increase your chances of success. Gaining skills and qualifications:

- Helps you make the most of your potential
- Opens doors to more choice in employment and higher education
- Improves your earning power
- Leads to greater job satisfaction

Full-time education

These are your options:

- Stay in full-time education, e.g. at a college or sixth form, doing A Levels, T Levels or other vocational and technical qualifications (VTQs)
- Start an apprenticeship or supported internship
- Work or volunteer part-time while in education or training
- All teenagers who do not gain a grade 4 or above in GCSE English and maths are expected to continue studying these subjects until the age of 18.

You could study full-time at a school sixth form, college or with an independent training provider. All study programmes will prepare you for higher level learning and employment and include opportunities for work experience and enterprise activities. They could work towards subject-based academic qualifications like A Levels and/or vocational and technical qualifications like T Levels or BTECs.

Apprenticeships

An Apprenticeship will prepare you for skilled employment and higher level education and training. Apprenticeships combine high-quality training with paid work.

> There are thousands of apprenticeship vacancies on offer, with more than 640 highquality apprenticeships approved for use by employers, and can help to kick-start a career in anything from space engineering to advertising.

Apprentices work towards qualifications that give them the theoretical knowledge and practical skills they need to do a job well. Your should start looking and applying for Apprenticeship vacancies very early in the spring term of year 11, even though you can't start one until after the "official school leaving date" in June.

Apprenticeships are competitive and open to all ages, so you wont be guaranteed an opportunity unless you meet the criteria and pass the selection process e.g., application, interview and in some cases assessment centre. You will need the support of your careers advisor/ teachers and parents to access this pathway.

Employment with training

You can find employment, undertake voluntary work, become an intern or even set up your own business when you leave school.

However, you'll still need to be doing training or study at the same time that leads to a regulated qualification, like a Vocational Technical Qualification (VTQ). This means that as well as gaining valuable experience, you'll also gain a recognised accreditation that supports your future career.



Supported Internship

Supported internships are a structured study programme based primarily at an employer.

They enable young people aged 16-24 with a statement of SEN, or an Education, Health and Care plan to achieve sustainable paid employment by equipping them with the skills they need for work, through learning in the workplace. Speak to your local college or school about this pathway and refer to your local council local offer website for more information.

Attend Open Days and Events

Take advantage of open days and events hosted by colleges, sixth forms, and universities. Visit campuses to get a feel for the environment, courses offered, and facilities available.
