
We also had a flurry of second and third place finishes on an excellent day for our athletes.


This Summer we brought back extra-curricular Softball and played away Maghull High School. The boys had a great time batting and field in their first competitive game.

#### **Transition Day**







On Thursday 27th June we invited our year 6 students to Maricourt for their Transition day. It was an action packed day and all students were a credit to their primary schools. The pupils tackled a range of activities with energy and a smile and it was great to see everyone fully engaged. All year 6 pupils were amazing! Some of the activities we ran included Science with Mr. Gunn. were the pupils focused on Chemistry and the Bunsen Burner!!! The pupils investigated how different metal compounds produce different coloured flames if held in a Bunsen. In the next Science lab Mrs Mulholland also had the pupil's engaged in chemistry. Pupils also investigated flame tests but, made a pH rainbow using different amounts of acid and alkali added to water. Groups then set off hydrogen balloons at the end of the session.

Finally with Mr Evans, they studied variables linked to Alka-Seltzer rockets, and investigated how different sized tablets changed the rate of reaction. This group of pupils also set off methane/oxygen rockets.



#### Art Trip to Liverpool

Year 7 artists went on a cultural appreciation trip to Liverpool city centre.

They have been studying architecture and colour this term in art, and have looked at Liverpool's cathedrals. We have focussed on the work of the artist John Piper, who designed the stained-glass corona (crown), at the top of the Metropolitan cathedral.

Pupils were able to experience first hand the majesty of the architecture. They noticed that the building looked very different in real life compared to looking at a picture. We were able to have a few precious minutes of reflection in the cathedral and soak up the spirituality the stained glass helps to create. Pupils showed their thoughtful and generous side by making voluntary donations to the cathedral on the way out, which was very touching.

This was followed by a walk along Hope Street to the Anglican cathedral, where pupils got a chance to see the contrasting architectural styles. Along the way we also got chance to see St Luke's 'bombed out church', The 'Three Graces', the Chinese arch and multiple sculptures. After lunch was time spent in the Museum of Liverpool. The displays were cross-curricular, celebrating Liverpool's contribution to art, sport, computing, music, drama, history, fashion and geography. Pupils were able to see the many successes from our locality, raising aspirations and understanding the need for creativity and diversity.

A thoroughly rewarding trip where art came to life and catapulted cultural appreciation of the wonderous city on our doorstep.



#### Duke of Edinburgh Award

Over 2 weekends in June, we have had students in Year 9 and 10 completing their expedition section of the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. This has involved students completing after school sessions in how to put up a tent, map reading and navigational skills, nutrition and cooking skills, as well as other camp craft, before embarking on a 2 day hike, approximately 10miles each day. All students were impeccably well behaved throughout and showed great resilience and teamwork skills.

There are 4 sections to complete at Bronze and Silver level. They involve helping the community/ environment, becoming fitter and healthier, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition. Aside from the expedition the other 3 sections must show a commitment for 3-6months.

#### Mr Varey

Mr Varey began teaching in Maricourt in 1989 and has been an integral part of the development of the school. Originally employed as a teacher of RE and maths, he very soon moved over to develop the computing and IT curriculum as he helped Maricourt navigate the introduction of the internet and more digital learning. He progressed through the ranks in school as Assistant Headteacher, Deputy Headteacher and was the Acting Headteacher in Autumn 2022. Mr Varey has always been very proud to be part of a MERCY school and recalls with great fondness the early days of his career when the school was blessed with the presence of the sisters. He has worked hard to ensure the history of the school will always be remembered and that our ethos remains firmly in the teachings of Catherine MacAuley.

Pupils in Maricourt have benefitted not only from Mr Varey's knowledge of Computing where he has taught numerous students up to A level, but also from his generous spirit in organising groups of pupils to visit Catherine MacAuley's house in Dublin and St Raphael's school in Sierra Leone where Mr Varey established a link. Doing this for a number of years, he has given up his own time frequently and generations of pupils will always be thankful for that. He has also been instrumental in introducing the link with the Confucius Institute and with the Latin Excellence Partnership. These links allow Maricourt students to learn Mandarin and Latin. Mr Varey's impact on the school is very evident and he will be a loss to the community. On behalf of all the pupils, staff, parents and governors of the school we want to say thank you for your years of service and we will hold you in our prayers for a long and happy retirement.


